

SOCIALISM AND NIHILISM.

BERLIN, Jan. 8.—It has been learned that numerous factory employes in Perm, Russia, have been arrested, and revolutionary documents discovered in their possession. Among the workmen of Perm there is a Socialist propaganda, and Socialism is rapidly spreading among the working population.

PARIS, Jan. 8.—Deputy Talandier's paper, *Republique, Democratique et Sociale*, has been indicted for inciting to murder and outrages against morality. This action is taken on account of the statement recently made in Talandier's paper that reprisals against the English would soon occur in Ireland and England to avenge the execution of O'Donnell. The article was written by Michael Murphy, an Irish anarchist, who has been expelled from France. The article advocated the employment of dynamite against the bourgeoisie.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 8.—A letter addressed to Count Tolstoi, Minister of the Interior, has been received, announcing that he has been sentenced to death by the Nihilists. It is also intimated that it is the intention of the Nihilists to murder Gen. Orscheffsky, M. Muraireff, Chief Public Prosecutor, and M. Dobrshansky, Public Prosecutor.

Lieut.-Col. Sudeikin, who was recently assassinated here, had expected to meet at the house where he was murdered a trusted spy in close association with the Nihilists, and he therefore left in his overcoat pockets the revolver and dagger which he usually carried for self-protection.
